





Exhibitions

Arthur M. Sackler Gallery

The Sackler Gallery's 2009–2010 exhibition season began on an auspicious note with *Falnama: Book of Omens*. Featured were rare, illustrated manuscripts created in sixteenth- and seventeenth-century Iran and Turkey and once used for divination by sultans, shahs, and commoners alike. The Sackler was the sole venue for this international exhibition, which included works from both public and private collections. Also in the Sackler, Hai Bo's five large-scale photographs of his hometown in Jilin province, China, were displayed in the Sackler's entrance pavilion as part of the *Perspectives* series of contemporary art. The *Moving Perspectives* series of contemporary video art from Asia continued with work by Korean artist Yeondoo Jung, exploring the fine line between truth and imagination.

In the spring of 2010 the museum hosted two exhibitions of Tibetan sacred art under the title *In the Realm of the Buddha*. A magnificent shrine room was presented to the public for the first time in *The Tibetan Shrine from the Alice S. Kandell Collection*, while *Lama, Patron, Artist: The Great Situ Panchen* offered a rare look at the life and legacy of an eighteenth-century Tibetan painter. Also opening in spring was *Gods of Angkor: Bronzes from the National Museum of Cambodia*, with thirty-six masterworks—including both Buddhist and Hindu deities—that illustrated an aspect of Khmer culture spanning some 1,600 years, from late prehistory through the Angkor period. The exhibition evolved from collaboration between the Freer and Sackler Galleries and the National Museum of Cambodia, which also resulted in a new conservation program at the latter institution. Fall 2010's highlight was *Fiona Tan: Rise and Fall*, an exhibition of photographs and videos by the contemporary Indonesian-born artist that marked the first major presentation of her work in the United States.

Freer Gallery of Art

Museum founder Charles Lang Freer believed that "all works of art go together." With that in mind, this year the Freer Gallery of Art presented thematic rotations of both Asian and American art from its unparalleled permanent collections. *Cornucopia: Ceramics from Southern Japan* featured more than 100 porcelain and stoneware vessels that highlighted a diverse and accomplished ceramic production over the centuries. Works from China were showcased in such exhibitions as *Children in Chinese Painting* and *Masterpieces of Chinese Painting*, which also featured scrolls and album leaves. *Chinamania: Whistler and the Victorian Craze for Blue-and-White* explored the significance of Chinese export porcelain in Victorian England, where it began as an object of serious aesthetic inspiration but soon proliferated as a popular status symbol. The exhibition included Chinese ceramics alongside drawings by American artist James McNeill Whistler, illustrating the melding of cultures that was the foundation of Charles Lang Freer's aesthetic.

Education and Public Programs

Visitor service was a key focus this year, and internal changes were made to improve the public experience of the museums. Goals were clarified and work realigned in an effort to bring our unique collections and resources to a broader audience. Visitor studies and related staff training are underway, the results of which will help us understand where we are achieving impact and where we need more work.

In the spirit of experimentation, we tip our hats to our docents for rolling out ExplorAsia, an experimental summer program for walk-in visitors that took place in the Freer Gallery. These informal, conversational experiences offered both family audiences and curious adults a variety of ways to engage with art.

All in all, this was a year rich in programs and connections to artworks, to communities, and to our visitors. In total, the Department of Education and Public Programs served more than 72,000 visitors through onsite programs and more than 600,000 through online resources.

The mission of the department is to offer our visitors experiences inspired by our collections and exhibitions that are engaging, relevant, and transformative. We extend our deep gratitude to Mrs. Nancy Fessenden and to the founders of the Education Program Fund for their ongoing support of this mission.

Tours and Spotlights

Both guided tours and conversational spotlights were offered throughout the year in special exhibitions and permanent collection galleries and in conjunction with selected public programs. Docent-facilitated tours or spotlights were integrated into the visitor experience for Asia After Dark and Nowruz programs. Docents provided specially planned gallery experiences for the adult workshops Conversing with Clay. Arts of China tours were offered and promoted in relation to the National Geographic Museum's exhibition Terra Cotta Warriors: Guardians of China's First Emperor.

In addition, two special tours were created for pan-Smithsonian collaborations, Footsteps Through Asia tours offered a perspective on Ibn Batutta's travels, in conjunction with the Imax film Journey to Mecca at the National Museum of Natural History. Perspectives on Portraiture tours provided an artists' view of the Sackler exhibition Fiona Tan: Rise and Fall and complemented similar tours offered at the National Portrait Gallery.

Throughout the year, more than 16,000 visitors were engaged in gallery experiences with docents: 8,268 in walk-in tours, 5,145 in reserved adult tours, and 3,150 in spotlight conversations.

School Programs

Live It Learn It: The Arts of Japan

In April and May 2010, the Freer and Sackler piloted a collaborative program with Live It Learn It, an educational organization that works with Washington, D.C.'s arts and cultural organizations to create engaging experiences that support academic achievement. Live It Learn It serves fourth-, fifth-, and sixth-grade classes at Title I District of Columbia Public Schools.

Two classes of fifth-grade students participated in the collaborative program, which focused on the arts of Japan. The program consisted of one previsit lesson in the classroom, an in-gallery experience at the Freer, and a post-visit lesson plan in the classroom. Students who participated in the arts of Japan pilot program scored 92 percent and 94 percent on their respective assessments, surpassing the Live It Learn It average of 83 percent.

Design, Publications, and Website

The Design Department carefully planned and beautifully executed exhibition spaces that were intrinsic to the works on view, whether traditional or contemporary. Subtle, nuanced lighting illuminated centuries-old illustrations in *Falnama: The Book of Omens*, while three-dimensional works in *Gods of Angkor: Bronzes from the National Museum of Cambodia* were displayed so the viewer could see the exquisite Khmer sculptures from all angles. Particular challenges the design team met with aplomb included creating a clean, contemporary space for Fiona Tan's multiple time-based installations in *Rise and Fall*, as well as constructing two separate—yet related—spaces for the pair of exhibitions that comprised In the *Realm of the Buddha*. Throughout these projects, the designers used the museum's new branding and graphic identity to create a strong, unified look in the galleries.

The Publications Department produced exhibition catalogues, interpretive materials, and educational materials that enhanced the museum experience for the scholar as well as the casual visitor. The catalogue for *Gods of Angkor* proved a popular addition to the exhibition, which originated at the Arthur M. Sackler Gallery before traveling to the J. Paul Getty Museum in Los Angeles. The department received numerous awards for its efforts over the 2009–2010 exhibition year, including first prize in the 2009 AAM Museum Publications Design Competition for the catalogues *The Tsars and the East: Gifts from Turkey and Iran in the Moscow Kremlin* and *Falnama: Book of Omens*. The museums' calendar of events was recognized for excellence by the Art Director's Club of Metropolitan Washington. In addition, the Publications Department continued to produce program notes for the Bill and Mary Meyer Concert Series, the annual record, *Ars Orientalis*, and *Asiatica*, among other ephemera.

The web team proudly launched a redesigned website that presents engaging content in a cleaner, more cohesive format and incorporates the museums' new graphic identity. To further expand the Galleries' ever-growing online presence, in February 2010 we launched the Song and Yuan Dynasty Painting and Calligraphy web resource. This invaluable online compilation, the culmination of years of research and preparation, presents the eighty-five Song and Yuan paintings in the Freer collection—among the most important in the world—accompanied by an unprecedented collection of bilingual scholarship. In May 2010, the online colloquium A Deeper Look at Surface Beauty brought together scholars from four institutions and participants around the world to discuss American art and Charles Lang Freer's aesthetic vision. And an ongoing series of podcasts and explore-and-learn features continues to give international audiences even more ways to experience our esteemed collections and events.

Archives

Management

The three-year project to catalogue highlights in the Ernst Herzfeld papers continues. Adding to the 1.400 drawings of Middle Eastern archaeology digitized and catalogued last year, the entirety of Herzfeld's extensive notebooks, inventories, sketchbooks, and photographs of the Samarra expeditions were added to the Smithsonian Institution Research Information System (SIRIS). Response from the scholarly community has been overwhelming, and collaborative projects with other institutions are being considered.

Additionally, the Archives was awarded a grant from the Smithsonian Collections Care and Preservation Fund (CCPF) to create multidimensional images of the Herzfeld squeezes. The department worked with the Museum Conservation Institute to image 393 squeezes. A web resource is currently being developed as the final product.

With a grant from NEAC/AAS, curator Ann Yonemura and Head of Archives David Hogge hosted a three-day workshop to assess the Archives' extensive holdings of early photography of Japan. Two noted scholars on Japanese photography, professors Luke Gartlan of the University of St. Andrews and Mikiko Hirayama of the University of Cincinnati, reviewed more than 800 items and supplied or corrected identifications and attributions. The results will be used to update catalogue information, as well as to develop future exhibition strategies.

Archivist Rachael Woody has been participating in a Smithsonian-wide EAD Gap Analysis project, funded by the Collections Information System/ Information Resource Management (CIS/IRM) pool. A consultant is reviewing online collection finding aids against national and Smithsonian standards.

Research

Representatives of the Yuanming Yuan (Old Summer Palace), Beijing, visited the Archives on December 1, 2009, as part of an investigative tour of American museums. Delegates were shown early photographs of the site from the Benjamin March papers and the Carl Whiting Bishop papers.

Outreach

An exhibition was held at the Tang Yun Gallery in Hangzhou from November 11–30, 2009, of the 1.925 photographs and diaries in the Benjamin March papers. The exhibition showed Hangzhou as it appeared 80 years ago and was a tremendous success, with more than 60,000 visitors in the first week alone.

Reproductions of the 1905 photographs of King Gojong and Crown Prince Sunjong in the Alice Roosevelt Longworth Collection were exhibited at the National Palace Museum of Korea in Seoul as part of the exhibition 100 Years Past: Memories of the Korean Empire, held from June 29–October 30, 2009.

Since December 2009, Rachael Woody has been researching how archival content can be shared through social media. She has helped develop Smithsonian-wide guidelines, strategic development, and training for SIRIS and SIASC contributors to the new Smithsonian Collections blog. During summer 2010 she created a series of instructional and collections highlights videos that are now hosted on the Freer|Sackler Archives YouTube Channel.

Woody helped organize the first-ever Archives Fair and Blogathon to celebrate American Archives Month in October. This outreach program brought in tens of thousands of viewers online and in person. Since November 2009, Archives staff has been guiding the Walters Art Museum in establishing its own formal archives. F|S archivists gave a presentation and tour to the Walters' director and staff, visited the museum's collections to help assess their current state, and provided sample documentation.

Library Services

Activities

The library was closed from October 1, 2009, through March 31, 2010, for the reading room/main stacks renovation. The renovation provides at least seven more years' worth of onsite space for the library's growing collection.

From October 5–9, 2009, the library hosted its annual workshop, this year titled "The Art of the Book in Edo and Meiji Japan, 1615–1912," as part of the University of Virginia Rare Book School program. Twelve attendees heard from Dr. Ellis Tinios, honorary lecturer at the University of Leeds, research associate at University of London, and special assistant at the British Museum. He delivered his presentation using the library's rare Japanese books, as well as books from the Pulverer Collection.

From October 11–19, 2009, Yue Shu attended the Workshop for Professional Librarians from Abroad in Taipei, organized by Sinological Resources and Services.

On April 16, 2010, Yue Shu gave an orientation on Chinese art reference literature at the University of Maryland Art History Department, which was attended by ten Chinese graduate students.

On Friends Day, September 11, 2010, the library organized a presentation titled "Paul Marks Collection on James McNeill Whistler." Marks, a collector and donor, gave a talk on his collection highlights and collecting experience for an audience of fourteen.

Significant Acquisitions

Thanks to the generous support of the Ellen Weedon Foundation, the library was able to purchase 小川裕允. 臥遊: 中国山水画一その世 界 (*Gayu: Chugoku Sansuiga: sono Sekai* [Idling through paintings: The World of Chinese landscape Painting]), published in 2008. It was written by Hiromitsu Ogawa, the 2009 recipient of the most prestigious award for East Asian historical studies, Kokka-sho (国華賞), and author of close to 300 books and articles on Chinese painting. This book is a result of Ogawa's 13-year, painstaking survey of more than 130 Chinese master paintings in the world, including works from the Freer collection. Another noteworthy acquisition supported by the Weedon Foundation was 加治幸子. 創作 版画の系譜: 総目録及び作品図版: 1905–1944 年 (Sosaku Hangashi no Keifu: Somokuji oyobi Sakuhin Zuhan: 1905–1944-nen [The Lineage of Sosaku Hanga Publications: A Complete Index and Illustrated Catalogues]), also published in 2008. Together with 9.000 reproduced images, the book indexes Japanese prints published in 111 titles of coterie magazines and art association and gallery periodicals on 創作版画 (Sosaku hanga, or creative prints) from 1905–44 in Japan. Also indexed are more than 1.600 print artists. This is an excellent aid for finding minor or rare publications by the Sosaku hanga artists.
