



Annual Benefit Gala

On November 17, 2010, the Freer and Sackler Galleries hosted the eleventh annual benefit gala to celebrate the reopening of the ancient Chinese jade and bronze galleries in the Freer. The festive evening highlighted the reinstalled galleries and the stunning works within, many of which were back on view after more than a decade in storage. Welcoming remarks by Smithsonian Secretary G. Wayne Clough and FIS Director Julian Raby were followed by a live auction of contemporary Chinese artworks, donated by such worldrenowned artists as Cai Guo-Qiang and Hai Bo. Guests enjoyed cocktails and a private preview of the galleries before dining at tables dressed in China red. The celebration ended with dessert and dancing in the Freer's beautiful corridors.

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Exhibitions

Arthur M. Sackler Gallery

The Arthur M. Sackler Gallery continued to present both contemporary and historical works of Asian art that engaged museum visitors with compelling and thought-provoking exhibitions. In the fall of 2010, the museum presented Shahnama: 1000 Years of the Persian Book of Kings, celebrating the millennium anniversary of the poet Firdawsi, whose Shahnama is considered to be one of the world's great works of literature. Created between the fourteenth and sixteenth century, the colorful folios on view conveyed the poet's sweeping narrative and mix of myth and history. In spring 2011, the exhibition Echoes of the Past: The Buddhist Cave Temples at Xiangtangshan deftly combined majestic sixth-century Chinese Buddhist sculpture with 3D imaging technology in an exploration of one of the most important groups of Buddhist devotional sites in early medieval China. An immersive cave offered a kinetic recreation of one of the largest stone temples at the site. The spring also saw the five-week exhibition Waves at Matsushima, in tribute to the earthquake and tsunami that struck the Pacific Coast of Japan in April. The exhibit featured images of Matsushima from the Freer collection, including a pair of seventeenth-century folding screens by Tawaraya Sotatsu and woodblock prints by Kawase Hasui.

Two 2011 exhibitions illustrated the public face of portraiture in Qing China. In the spring, Family Matters: Portraits from the Qing Court featured sixteen paintings representing several generations of the Qing imperial family, from the early to mid-eighteenth century. In the fall, Power|Play: China's Empress Dowager featured black-and-white photographs of Empress Dowager Cixi (1835–1908). Staged and often presented as diplomatic gifts, the carefully created images offered new insights into Qing court culture, as well as Cixi's public and private life.

The Perspectives series of contemporary art filled the Sackler's vaulted pavilion with works by noted video artists. Perspectives: Lu Chunsheng featured History of Chemistry I, a video that references a distant history while conveying the sense of dislocation wrought by modernization. Perspectives: Hale Tenger incorporated a sense of recent history as the artist filmed the façade of the Saint Georges Hotel in Beirut—the site of the assassination of the former prime minister of Lebanon—while it was being renovated. The work, a compelling blend of history and poetry, presented a mysterious yet deeply moving narrative to the viewer.

In July 2011, Ancient Iranian Ceramics was installed in the Sackler Gallery, which received a rave review in the December issue of Ceramics Monthy. Throughout the year, a series of thematic installations of Chinese art showed the power and poetry of the Chinese artist's brush. These included Seasons: Chinese Landscapes, The Orchid in Chinese Painting, and Seasons: Chinese Flowers.

Freer Gallery of Art

In April 2011, the Peacock Room was reinstalled and restored to its appearance in 1908, when museum founder Charles Lang Freer used it to organize and display more than 250 ceramics he acquired throughout Asia. The Peacock Room Comes to America illustrated Freer's belief that "all works of art go together" and that there are "points of contact" between American and Asian art. In neighboring galleries, highlights of Freer's collection of ancient Chinese jades and bronzes returned to public view after almost a decade, marking the first phase of a three-year plan to reimagine the Freer's entire suite of six Chinese galleries. The museum possesses one of the finest collections of ancient Chinese bronzes outside China, representing all periods of the Bronze Age, and its remarkable collection of ancient jades features pieces produced by the late Neolithic Liangzhu culture. The Seasons series of thematic rotations continued in the Freer, highlighting the importance of the seasons in Chinese and Japanese art and culture. Seasons: Japanese Screens featured screens painted to represent various times of year. Seasons: Tea included a dozen examples of how tea wares and utensils changed to incorporate a season's essential quality, such as the chill of winter or the heat of summer.

Education and Public Programs

The Education Department of the Freer and Sackler Galleries continued to present strong public programming throughout the year to coordinate with exhibition openings and special events. This included film festivals, concerts, and family days as well as hands-on activities in the ImaginAsia classroom. Adult interactive programs helped audiences engage with the museums' collections in new and thought-provoking ways, and included a reading by celebrated poet Gary Snyder in concert with the exhibition Seasons: Chinese Landscapes. The annual Nowruz celebration, now in its third year, brought in thousands of visitors who participated in storytelling, music, and family events. Gallery interpreters, from docents to Artizens, engaged the public in meaningful conversations about selected artworks to provide a richer experience for our visitors. In-museum programs were complemented by our ever-increasing resources online, providing substantial learning opportunities for our virtual visitors.

Facilitated Gallery Interpretation

Both guided tours and conversational Spotlights were offered by docents throughout the year, for special exhibitions and permanent collection galleries and in conjunction with selected public programs. More than 12,000 visitors engaged in gallery experiences with docents: 7,560 in walk-in tours, 3,233 in reserved adult and youth tours, and 1,822 in Spotlight conversations.

Between January and April 2011, the Freer|Sackler implemented an experimental interpretive program. Twenty-one competitively selected, creative, energetic, and outgoing volunteers (age 18 or older) served as Gallery Teachers for the exhibition Shahnama: 1000 Years of the Persian Book of Kings. During February, this special group was trained in gallery teaching techniques and learned basic information about the Freer and Sackler Galleries and the Shahnama exhibition. The volunteers began their work in early March by conversing with visitors about the art and culture represented in our galleries and concluded their program in mid-April. Their efforts in encouraging guests to share perspectives and personal connections with the works were much appreciated; one of our visitors commented, "The Smithsonian is ahead of the curve on this one." Shahnama Gallery Teachers served 1,646 visitors over seven Saturdays and seven Sundays in March and April.

The Shahnama Gallery Teacher program was the precursor and test case for the new Artizen gallery interpretation program. Artizens are volunteers

who engage visitors in conversations about art and culture, building cross-cultural bridges and encouraging guests to share their perspectives and personal connections with the works in our galleries. Artizens casually interact with visitors of all ages, encouraging them to explore Asian and American art through conversation, storytelling, and hands-on activities. They also answer general museum questions, introduce visitors to the collections and history of the Galleries, and assist with interpretive programs.

Artizens work in the galleries on weekend afternoons throughout the year, weekend and weekday afternoons in the summer, and occasional evenings. The first group of twenty Artizens was selected and trained in the spring of 2011 and began in late June. From June to September, Artizens interacted with more than 2,000 visitors: 1,434 in gallery conversations, 201 at the interactive Unearthing Chinese Art cart, 107 in inner-artist workshops, and 354 in summer drop-in programs.

ExplorAsia

In 2011, ExplorAsia programming for families expanded to include facilitated interactive carts and two summer drop-in programs. Overall, ExplorAsia programs served more than 1,000 visitors.

A permanent interactive cart was developed to explore the jades and bronzes in the Freer's ancient Chinese art galleries. The Unearthing Chinese Art cart features examples of natural and carved jade and the tools used to shape them, as well as bronze samples, maps, and photographs to extend the gallery experience and engage visitors in conversation. A temporary interactive cart called The Elegant Orchid was offered for a week in July to complement the Sackler exhibition *The Orchid in Chinese Painting*. This cart featured orchid fragrance, Chinese music, photographs of flowers, and artist tools and materials to handle.

In July and August, two drop-in programs were offered, facilitated by docents and Artizens. The July program focused on *The Orchid in Chinese Painting* and activities such as flower-arranging, creating personal symbols, and family poetry-writing. All activities were directly linked with close looking and conversation about the artwork in the exhibition. The August program, Painting the Seasons, took place in the Freer's Japanese

galleries and offered opportunities for families to explore paintings of cranes, owls, cherry blossoms, and samurai to discover the sights, sounds, and activities of the seasons in Japan. Activities included role-playing, poetry-writing, and a handson exploration of a miniature model of a Japanese screen.

ImaginAsia

ImaginAsia is a program for children ages eight to fourteen and their adult companions. Space and supplies permitting, and in collaboration with other museum programs, ImaginAsia has served artists of all ages. In fiscal year 2011, ImaginAsia hands-on art programs served nearly 9,000 visitors. This number includes 1,773 visitors who participated in ImaginAsia programs in the Freer|Sackler and an additional 3,635 visitors who used activity books, available at the VIARC (now OVS) information desks, to explore special exhibitions and the permanent collection.

Five hundred young urban professionals enjoyed ImaginAsia hands-on activities at Asia After Dark and 1.470 participated in ImaginAsia programs for Nowruz. Eight hundred children participated in ImaginAsia activities at the Smithsonian Gardens Family Orchid Day at the National Museum of Natural History. Nearly 700 participants took part in storytelling and dance activities created by ImaginAsia for the National Air and Space Museum's kite festival. As the festival focused on Indian kites, we loaned kites from our collection and set up the display in cases provided by the museum. Thirty-two visitors made miniature gardens for meditation at the ImaginAsia activity that was part of the Haupt Garden's Garden Fest.

And Jason Hwang's EDGE ensemble gave the Washington premiere of his concert-length jazz work, Burning Bridge, in conjunction with Fiona Tan: Rise and Fall. Seven new concert podcasts went live in FY 2011, from performances recorded between 1998 and 2011, featuring music from Japan, India, Sri Lanka, Iran, and Portugal. They were downloaded by more than 25,000 listeners.

NOVEMBER 4-8 2010

On February 27, the Freer|Sackler hosted an Insights event on Echoes of the Past for the Chicago Society of the University of Chicago, attracting more than 100 guests. In addition to exhibition tours, the evening featured a panel discussion with Kathy Tsiang, curator of the Chicago presentation of the exhibition: Jason Salavon. artist and creator of the Digital Cave; and J. Keith Wilson, curator for the Smithsonian presentation of the exhibition. On April 27, four young curators from Kabul (Afghanistan), Mosul (Iraq), Ammam (Jordan), and Sharjah (UAE) were given an intensive introduction to the Freer|Sackler's ancient Near Eastern art collections, as well as to museum organization and logistics. On May 1, guest speaker Deborah Klimburg-Salter (European Association for South Asian Archaeology and Art) spoke about her recent work in the Kabul Museum, Afghanistan. The events were coordinated by the Freer|Sackler curatorial staff.

Design, Publications, and Website

The Design Department reconceived and re-envisioned two of the Chinese galleries in the Freer with the installation of Ancient Chinese Jades and Bronzes. The design included new casework and the restoration of the original terrazzo floors, complemented by superlative lighting that made both galleries glow. In addition, the Design Department created beautiful spaces for exhibitions that included Shahnama: 1000 Years of the Persian Book of Kings, a look at folios from one of the greatest masterpieces of world literature by the eminent poet Firdawsi. Echoes of the Past: The Buddhist Cave Temples of Xiangtangshan, an exhibition organized by the Smart Museum of Art, the University of Chicago, and the Arthur M. Sackler Gallery, combined majestic sixth-century Chinese Buddhist sculpture with 3D imaging technology. The designers met the challenges of working with monumental artworks as well as creating a digital, immersive recreation of one of the largest stone temples. Touch screens and research kiosks were cleverly integrated into the exhibition. The black-and-white photographs in Power | Play: China's Empress Dowager were taken from thirty-six original glass plate negatives in the Freer|Sackler Archives. Shown in exquisitely lit rooms, the exhibition illustrated the role of photography in shaping the empress's image. In a neighboring gallery, Family Matters: Portraits from the Qing Court showed sixteen paintings, often life-size, of several generations of the Qing dynasty imperial family, in the age just before photography became synonymous with portraiture.

The Publications Department produced award-winning exhibition catalogues, interpretive materials, and ephemera, as well as the annual magazine Asiatica. The catalogue Shipwrecked: Tang Treasures and Monsoon Winds describes the adventures of a ninth-century ship based on research from its newly found cargo, and illuminates an important—and ongoing—aspect of maritime archaeology. Gods of Angkor: Bronzes from the National Museum of Cambodia won first prize in the exhibition catalogue category at the 2011 American Association of Museums Publications Design Competition, while posters for the exhibition In the Realm of the Buddha won honorable mention. Asiatica received first prize in the annual reports category from the Art Directors Club of Metropolitan Washington, as well as two awards from the PGAMA (Printing and Graphics Association Mid-Atlantic) Excellence in Print Awards, including "Best in Show" and "Best Use of Photography." The invitation package for the Dancing Dragon, Roaring Tiger benefit gala also received acknowledgment from PGAMA. In addition, the Publications Department continued to produce program notes for the Bill and Mary Meyer Concert Series, volumes 39 and 40 of Ars Orientalis, and educational materials.

Creating a robust experience for virtual visitors, the web team continued to engage viewers with its Explore and Learn interactive features. These included deeper explorations of the exhibitions Waves at Matsushima and Echoes of the Past: The Buddhist Cave Temples of Xiangtangshan, as well as an in-depth look at the tenth-century Shiva Nataraja (Lord of the Dance), the exquisite Chola bronze in the Freer collection, and the Qing dynasty scroll Mountain and Rivers Without End as interpreted by eminent poet Gary Snyder. The Freer was one of the pilot museums in Google Art Project, offering more than one hundred works of art in high definition. The web team worked closely with the Education Department to prepare seven podcasts of concerts that were presented in the Meyer Auditorium. Beginning in May 2011, museum visitors were able to engage with two important objects in our collection using the Microsoft Surface Table: A Breath of Spring, a fourteenth-century handscroll, and folios from the Haft Awrang (Seven Thrones) by the fifteenth-century poet Jami. The table enabled visitors to view both the scroll and the manuscript from end-to-end and cover-to-cover.

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Archives

Management

Progress continued on scanning and cataloguing extensive portions of the Ernst Herzfeld papers. To date, nearly 7,000 records have been made available to researchers via the Smithsonian's Collections website, and we have seen a dramatic increase in Google search traffic.

Herzfeld's 3,800 original glass plate negatives were digitized and will be linked to online records, making the Herzfeld collection one of the most extensive archaeological research collections on the internet. Archivist Rachael Woody oversaw the development of informational web pages and videos. In addition, the three-dimensional scanning project that Woody initiated the previous year was completed, providing a model for the application of emerging technologies to display archival collections in new ways to new audiences.

Acquisitions

Significant acquisitions to the Archives in FY 2010 include:

Three Portraits of Royal Nepalese Women

These hand-painted photographic portraits are of the daughters of the Rana of Nepal and the Prime Minister (1931–43) Juddah Samshar Janga Badahar Rana. The photos are said to date from the 1910s to 1920s. (HAND-PAINTED GELATIN SILVER PRINTS; PURCHASE)

Photography Album of Iraq

"Camera Studies in Iraq" is a snakeskin-bound photo album from the 1920s. The album features 73 rare photomechanical reproductions of landscapes, mosque architecture, family portraits, street scenes, and bazaar snapshots. (PURCHASE)

Album of Photographs by Antoin Sevruguin

This early album features 99 mounted albumen prints by noted photographer of Iran's Qajar period Antoin Sevruguin (late 1830s—1933). Sixtytwo extremely well-preserved albumen prints were found sandwiched between the front and back covers of the album. (PURCHASE)

Research

Brinda Kumar of Cornell University joined the growing number of scholars researching Charles Lang Freer's pioneering collections practices by exploring his acquisitions of South Asian art. Scholars Ying-chen Peng of the University of California, Los Angeles; Liana Chen of George Washington University; and Yuhang Li of University of Chicago visited the Archives to study the Empress Dowager photographic materials. They presented some of their material in a panel presentation at the Association of Asian Studies conference in Honolulu, and made substantive contributions to the exhibition *Power|Play*, which opened in September 2011.

Library Services

Activities

The library was awarded \$10,000 from the Smithsonian Scholarly Studies Program to organize a one-week workshop on Chinese rare books for Chinese studies librarians in North America. Led by two Chinese book scholars, one from Shandon Library, China, and the other from Princeton University, "Workshop of Chinese Rare Books" was held on July 11–15, 2011. The workshop, attended by nineteen librarians, covered cataloguing, preservation, Chinese publishing history, hands-on practice using the library collection, and other issues related to the study of Chinese rare materials. These discussions were supplemented by related talks for a general audience.

On October 3–7, 2011, the library hosted the workshop "The Art of the Book in Edo and Meiji Japan, 1615–1912" as part of the University of Virginia's Rare Book School program. Dr. Ellis Tinios, honorary lecturer at the University of Leeds, research associate at University of London, and special assistant at the British Museum, taught the workshop, which was attended by eight people. His presentation included some of the library's rare Japanese books, as well as books from the Pulverer collection.

On the Freer|Sackler Friends Day (SEPTEMBER 17, 2011), Yue Shu led a presentation titled "Rare Chinese Books in the Freer|Sackler Library." She gave four attendees a brief history of Chinese books and the library's Chinese rare book collection.

The library started online, in-house circulation in November.

Significant Acquisitions

Thanks to the generous support of the Ellen Weedon Foundation, the library was able to purchase two important titles on Japonism in France: ジャポニスム期の美術評論家、美術商およびコレクター Japonisumu-ki no bijutsu hyoroka, bijutsush oyobi korekut [Art critics, dealers and collectors in the time of Japonism]. 2 vols. France was the center of Japonism from the nine-teenth to early twentieth century. These reprint publications include works by prominent French critics, art collectors, and art dealers as well as their auction catalogues, offering crucial primary sources for the study of how certain art was evaluated and accepted by Western society. They also provide vital information on Japanese art that migrated to the West and the roles of art dealers and collectors.

Another significant acquisition was 林忠正コレクション Hayashi Tadamasa korekushon [Collection Hayashi], published by ゆまに書房 in 2000. This five-volume set comprises reprinted auction catalogues of prominent art dealer Tadamasa Hayashi, who brought the Japanese art boom to Europe and contributed to the European Japonism movement. Freer purchased some objects from Hayashi and the library has other works related to him, including his correspondences, unpublished documents, and biography. This title is an ideal addition to complete our research resources on this important dealer. The purchase was made possible by a donation from Metropolitan Center for Far Eastern Art, Kyoto, Japan.
